



2. Review of Literature

G. Mitu Gulati, T. M Thomas Issac, William. A. Kiein (2002) They conducted a case study of DINESH BEEDI, a very successful, large worker cooperative in south India, which worked well for a long time. They identified the importance of workplace culture and other informal machanisms for maximising cooperative productivity. They also tried to find the ratio of unique circumstances and cooperative nature in the success of a cooperative. They concluded that continuous success of KDB Worker cooperative depends on the unique set of circumstances, which cannot be generalised.

Ramesh (2006) His article gives a detailed history of Kerala Dinesh Beedi Cooperative. He explained the whole story of KDB's the golden era, crisis it faced and its revival. His study reveals that team spirit and worker solidarity were stronger than political rivalry.

Boney Bose (2018) published a paper titled "the role played by VICIB in women empowerment and economic development in Kottayam district, Kerala" in international journal for Research in Engineering application and Management. In his study, he found that the arrival of VICIB made a drastic development both socially and economically in kodumpidy area. Women and poor farmers are the most benefited group because of the establishment of Sandhya Development Society and VICIB. VICIB save them from debt traps and money lenders. He concluded that VICIB is playing a leading role in women empowerment and economic development of Kodumpidy area.

Kanjikuzhi service co-operative bank of Alappuzha district brought forward the idea of vanitha selfie. The venture was inaugurated by ADGP B Sandhya back in 2017, since then the group has proven itself by successfully managing over 500 events. The group currently has over 200 members, constituted by housewives, students, MNREGP labourers and wage laborers including women climbing coconut sapling with modern tools from Kanjikuzhi village. Sudarshanabhai teacher, a member of the state faculty of Kudumbasree is also accompanying them by leading the program. The name, Vanitha selfie, derived from the thoughts of the bank president adv. M. Santhoshkumar. When the venture commences, uniform and necessary equipment are purchased through a bank loan. They are

MALABAR MEAT

Initiative of Brahmagiri Development Society

Malabar meat is a revolutionary initiative of Brahmagiri Development Society which focus on processing high quality buffalo meat, mutton, rabbit and poultry products and all these products are marketed through outlets in the brand name, *Malabar Meat*. ¹In total 302 Gramasree SHGs have been registered under Brahmagiri Development Society in 5 zones of Mananthavadi, Kalpetta, Poothadi, Pulppalli and Sulthan Bathery. Among them more than 80 SHGs are performing well. It is for the first time in the state Self Help Groups for Dairy farmers were formed. The cumulative investment of these groups is Rs.45 lakhs. These SHGs have taken up various socio – economic programmes in the rural villages of Wayanad district. An amount of Rs.7 Lakhs was provided as revolving fund for 38 SHGs.
