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Abstract: *Kalimpong has a unique, rich and diverse religious history. It is home to many religious sites such as monasteries, churches, temples and mosque. Among them, Mangaldham is one of the most prominent shrines. It has its own distinctive history. This religious place was established in honor of Guruji Shri Mangaldas Maharaj who came to Kalimpong in 1940 inspired by its natural beauty and communal harmony. His contributions are not only significant in the history of Mangaldham but also commendable in the religious and cultural spheres of Kalimpong. Guruji Shri Mangaldas ji's concept 'work is worship' was reflected in his efforts, including the establishment of orphanages, schools, hospitals, and more. Over time, Mangaldham has evolved into an important pilgrimage hub in the Eastern Himalayas, attracting devotees from neighboring regions such as Nepal, Bhutan, and beyond. Its serene location, spiritual ambiance, and association with Guruji Shri Mangaldas Ji have made it a focal point of regional religious tourism.*

1. Introduction

Before delving into the history of Mangaldham, it is necessary to understand the biography and contributions of Guruji Mangaldas Ji. Shri Mangaldasji Maharaj was born in 1896 in Melbote, Illam district, Nepal. Losing his father at the age of four, he was nurtured spiritually from an early age and received renunciation at twelve. He then dedicated his life to spreading Krishna Dharma. After visiting many religious places, he eventually arrived in the Kalimpong region of India.

The Spread of Pranami Dharma in Kalimpong:

The Pranami religion began to spread in Kalimpong around the year 1900. Mahatma Shri Dayal Das and his wife Mata Raj Bai established the Shri Krishna Pranami Temple in Ichhe. Brahmachari Mangal was 40 years old when he arrived in Kalimpong and the Ichhe Temple Panchayat Committee appoints him as the temple director. Under his leadership, the temple expanded from worship activities to farming and the establishment of a cowshed. Around the same time, a religious debate was held at the Shiva temple, in which he emerged victorious. After managing the temple for three consecutive years, he began preaching in Kalimpong.

After the request made by Barrister Ari Bahadur Gurung, Guruji went to his house in Tirpai for the treatment of the stomach pain of his aunt Ben Bai. Through Ben Bai, he got

an opportunity to meet Maharaja Bai, mother of Shri Damber Sinngh Gurung (founder of Bharatiya Gorkha League). After receiving the initiation mantra (Dikcha) from Maharaja Bai, Pranami Dharma gradually spread in Kalimpong Bazaar. Iswar Das Agarwal and Begraj Agarwal accepted the initiation mantra then. In this way, Brahmachari Mangal is now addressed as guruji Mangal Das. His disciples bestowed the title of Guruji on him.

Shri Guruji bought a piece of land in the middle of Kalimpong market, and the construction of the temple began. The puja for the first time started on the occasion of the Holi festival of 1940. Shri Manik Das became the first priest of the temple. After that, the awareness programme started increasing among the Marwari, Nepali and Bihari communities in the market. He started visiting surrounding places like Lole and Pala around Kalimpong from time to time to preach religion.

Institutional Vision of Guruji:

Guruji Shri Mangaldas ji's concept 'work is worship' applied to his own work by building orphanages, schools, hospitals etc. Though he had to overcome many community reactions and challenges in the initial phase to give practical form to his philosophy. Guruji was immensely propounded by the holistic environment of Kalimpong who thought of establishing an ideal school for women empowerment in the heart of the town. He started a small infant school with the motto of Gyan, Bhakti and Sewa with only 14 students in the temple. The then under -constructed Shri Krishna Pranami Temple was situated at Ram Chandra Mintri Road, near Kanchan Cinema Hall, 9 ¾ Mile Kalimpong without any proper infrastructure. After four years of construction of the temple, he saw that along with the religion, education should be promoted too. Eight to ten children were gathered and the Bal Mandir Primary School was established. Shri Pancham Das ji was appointed as the first teacher. Gradually the number of Children increased. Over the years, it expanded to a Junior High School, High School, and then Higher Secondary School. Shri N.B. Gurung was instrumental as the school committee chairman in obtaining government recognition and grants.

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Guruji Pranami Trust and its Objectives:

In 1972, driven by a deep commitment to uplift poor, needy, and destitute children, Guruji united likeminded individuals from neighboring areas and laid the foundation for the Guruji Pranami Mission Trust. (Kalimpong Sub-divisional Court Regd. No. IV-130/1972)

- To promote and spread social service and non-violence, and to manage Shri Prannath Brahmacharya Ashram with Sanskrit Pathsala at Haidar Para, Siliguri.
- To develop infrastructure, maintain discipline, and frame rules for proper administration of these institutions, and to support schools, colleges, libraries, hostels, and research centers, with or without fees, as decided by the Trustees.
- To provide scholarships and assistance to students at all levels of study in India or abroad, and to help similar societies and institutions through grants and donations.
- To encourage the study of philosophy, social science, culture, and all branches of knowledge including arts, science, medicine, engineering, law, and commerce, and to conduct charitable activities for the upliftment of humanity.

Mangaldham's Religious and Socio-cultural Practices:

Guruji Pranami Mission Trust decided to build a grand memorial temple of Guruji in 1993 A.D. The Guruji Shri 108 Mangal Das Ji Memorial Committee with the help of devout donors, the construction of Mangal Dham was completed after eight years of continuous efforts. The Samadhi of Pujya Guruji is in the lower surface of the said Dham. The upper level features a grand hall with a Shree Raj Shyama Ji temple, statues of Mahamati Pranath Ji, Shri Guruji, eight tableaux depicting key events from the lives of Shri Devchandra ji and Krishna, including his birth, a vision of Krishna by Jamuna, the adoption of Govardhana, Rasa Leela etc.

Mangal Dham's philosophy deeply integrates the principles of Krishna Pranami Dharma, which emphasize monotheism, compassion, and a simple, moral life. The temple's daily worship practices include meticulous scripture recitation and devotional rituals that foster spiritual growth and community bonding. Regular educational programs and satsangs further promote the understanding of the Dharma's teachings, reinforcing moral values and devotion among followers. These elements collectively shape the institutional identity of Mangal Dham as a center of spiritual learning, service, and adherence to the Pranami way of life, preserving the legacy of Guruji Shri Mangaldasji Maharaj through active practice.

Guru Mangaldasji, recognizing the urgent need for a shelter home in Kalimpong, established the Pranami Balika Seva Ashram in 1966, which was licensed by the Government of West Bengal Social Welfare Department (License No. 789). The Ashram was created to offer a safe asylum and comprehensive charitable services to needy children. It operates under the governance of the Mission Trust and the Managing Committee in accordance with the Juvenile Act, 2000. Pranami Balika Vidya Mandir, located in Kalimpong, provides education to the Ashram's children, who are also encouraged to participate in games, sports, yoga, spiritual discourses, and cultural activities to nurture their talents.

Another initiative, the Pranami Bal Seva Ashram at Haider Para, Siliguri, was founded earlier in 1966 (License No. 678/SWD), offering value-based learning for spiritual growth. Shri Krishna Pranami Vidya Niketan, situated in Siliguri, is affiliated with the Central Board of Secondary Education, New Delhi. Seva Sadan Hospital in Kalimpong, established in 1968 under the Trust's inspiration, provides comprehensive medical services including outpatient, inpatient, ambulance, and other facilities. The Free Homeopathy Clinic at Pranami Mandir Road, Siliguri, launched in 1981, offers free treatment through a dedicated team of homeopathy doctors. To support the nutritional needs of children, the Trust maintains Goushalas in Kalimpong and Siliguri, promoting cow domestication. Additionally, Dharamsalas in both locations serve guests and visitors, operating under specific norms and conditions set by the Trust to ensure their welfare during their stay.

Architectural and Artistic Expression of Mangaldham:

Completed in 1993, Mangal Dham is a spectacular example of blending traditional Hindu temple symbolism with modern architectural design. Spanning two acres, the temple features carved depictions of Krishna Leela and deities rendered in vibrant paint. The temple integrates local stone masonry and contemporary concrete work, symbolizing a renewal of Hindu religiosity combined with accessibility for modern devotees. Its silent and serene grounds contrast urban activity, emphasizing sacred space creation in a transitioning townscape. Mangaldham's serene grounds feature vivid artworks, a prayer hall housing the idols of Raj Shyamji, Prannathji, and Mangaldasji, and its ground floor holds the revered samadhi of the founder. This temple stands as a symbol of devotion, service to humanity, and the rich religious heritage of Kalimpong. Mangal Dham Temple features a striking white exterior and spacious two-acre layout, with its main prayer hall designed to accommodate large gatherings of devotees. The temple complex showcases vivid murals depicting the life of Lord Krishna, intricate ornamental pillars, and beautifully landscaped gardens. Its ground floor houses the samadhi of Guruji Mangaldasji Maharaj, and calm corridors encourage peaceful reflection, making it a harmonious blend of spirituality and elegant architecture.

Mangal Dham has evolved into a significant pilgrimage hub in the Eastern Himalayas, attracting devotees from neighboring regions including Nepal, Bhutan, and beyond. Its serene location, spiritual ambiance, and association with Guruji Shri Mangaldasji Maharaj have made it a focal point for regional religious tourism. The institutionalization of major religious festivities and collective community rituals at Mangal Dham fosters a strong sense of unity and devotion among pilgrims. These organized celebrations, combined with the temple's charitable and educational initiatives, reinforce its status as a vibrant center for spiritual gathering and cultural exchange, drawing people from diverse backgrounds to participate in shared religious experiences.

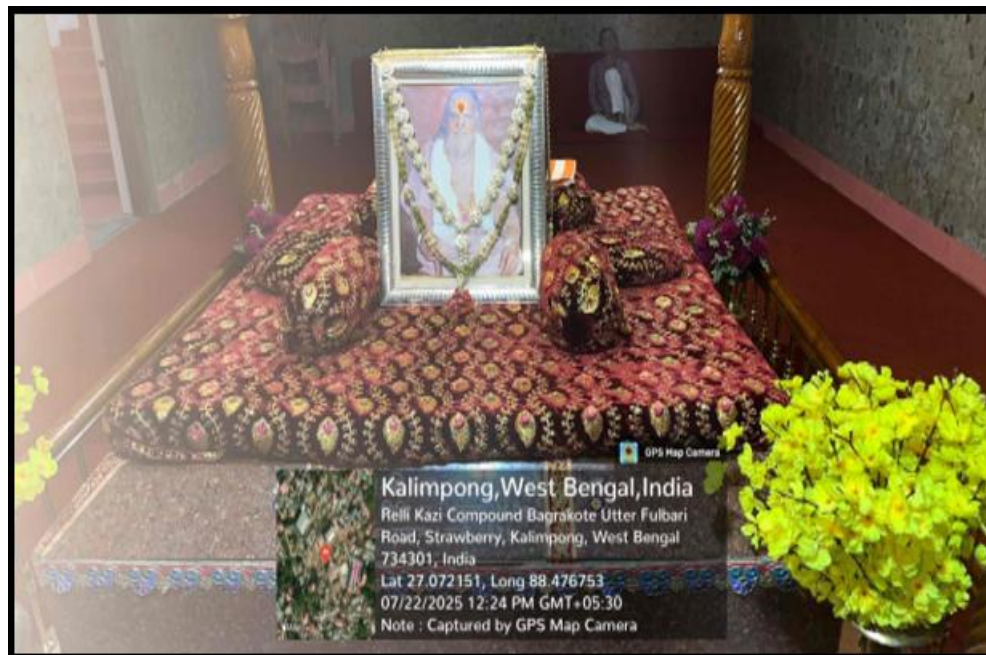
2. Conclusion

After arriving at Kalimpong, Guruji gradually spread his philosophy across the lands of the eastern Himalayan states

of India including Nepal and Bhutan. He started dedicating himself to social service by establishing temples, schools, orphanages, and uplifting the community through compassion and simplicity. His life of non attachment and non sacrifice influenced the people. Many people became his disciples and they were initiated into Pranami Dharma. Everyone started calling him Guruji. Along with the spiritual awakening of the people, he also took up various tasks of serving the society. He also realized the need of Shelter Homes in Kalimpong and Siliguri. Though Guru Mangaldas ji breathed his last in 1985, his legacy is still remembered in Mangaldham



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
