Milton's first published work was in 1645 in poetry when he was 20 years old. The Age of Melton was primarily known as 1625-1610. He died when he was almost sixty six years old on or about 8th November, 1675 at his home at Artillery walk toward Bun hills field. As the title indicates Darcy is proud.
