Utilizing the Power of Proximity

Proximity is a powerful classroom management tool. Teachers can influence student's behaviour and attention through their physical presence. Moving closer to students who are distracted often redirects behaviour without verbal confrontation. Additionally, body language and facial expressions serve as effective non-verbal methods to maintain student focus. Proximity also allows teachers to provide individualized support while still maintaining awareness of the entire classroom.

Creating an Interactive Classroom Environment

An interactive classroom environment encourages students to participate actively in the learning process. Classroom setup should be pleasant and organized to support engagement. Teachers should provide opportunities for students to interact with peers, share ideas, and collaborate. Adopting various teaching learning methods can enhance the

effective learning. Clear communication of expectations, combined with student-centered activities, contributes to a positive and participatory learning climate.

Using Non-Verbal Cueing

Non-verbal cues are valuable tools for managing classroom behaviour and controlling noise levels.
