In **1991**, **arXiv.org** was established by Cornell University Libraries as an open repository for research papers in fields such as physics, mathematics, computer science, biology, and economics, serving millions of scholarly articles. The **Public Knowledge Project (PKP)**, founded in **1998** by John Willinsky and colleagues, developed the **Open Journal Systems (OJS)** in **2001**, an open-source platform that supports the publication and management of academic journals. **BioMed Central**, established in **2000** by Jan Velterop, became a leading open-access publisher with hundreds of journals in life sciences, health sciences, medicine, and applied sciences. Similarly, the **Public Library of Science (PLOS)**, founded in **2001**, launched **PLOS ONE** in **2003** and has since become a major non-profit organization dedicated to advancing open science and ensuring that research is freely accessible to everyone.

Together, these initiatives have significantly contributed to the growth of open access, democratizing knowledge and promoting the global exchange of information.

Emergence of Open Access Publications

The emergence of Open Access (OA) publications marked a significant transformation in scholarly communication during the early 21st century. The movement gained momentum through the three landmark declarations known as the BBB initiatives-Budapest (2002), Bethesda (2003), and Berlin (2003). The Budapest Open Access Initiative emphasized the internet as a global platform for sharing scientific knowledge and ensuring unrestricted access to research. The Bethesda Statement highlighted the responsibility of researchers to disseminate their findings freely and rapidly, while the Berlin Declaration promoted the internet as a powerful medium for the worldwide exchange of scientific information. The growth of OA was further supported by the establishment of repositories and platforms such as arXiv (1991), PubMed Central, and PLOS Journals, along with the launch of the Open Journal Systems (OJS) in 2001. Important developments such as DSpace and Creative Commons in 2002, the Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ) in 2003, the IFLA Statement on Open Access in 2004, and OpenDOAR in 2006 strengthened the OA ecosystem. Together, these initiatives and platforms revolutionized scholarly publishing by making research more accessible, visible, and beneficial to the global academic community.

Publishers can recoup their cross through a number of mechanisms, including through payments from authors called article processing charges (APCs), or through advertising, donations or other subsidies.
Archiving Colors	Green	Can archive pre-print and post-print: This means depositing the final peer-reviewed research output in an electronic archive called a repository. Repositories can be run by the researcher's institution, but shared or subject repositories are also commonly used. Access to the research output can be granted either immediately or after an agreed embargo period.
	Blue	Can archive post-print (i.e., final draft post-refereeing)
	Yellow	Can archive pre-print (i.e. pre-refereeing)
	White	Archiving not formally supported

This economic barrier is further complicated by the proliferation of predatory journals that threaten the movement's credibility, alongside a deep-seated cultural emphasis on traditional impact factors for career advancement, which frequently incentivizes researchers to favor restricted-access subscription models. Furthermore, systemic issues such as inadequate dedicated funding and fragile infrastructure for institutional repositories restrict growth, while legal and intellectual anxieties- ranging from copyright complexities to the fear of idea theft- stifle open sharing. Ultimately, even where OA mandates have been introduced, ensuring effective implementation and widespread compliance remains a persistent challenge.
